
Plant and Cake Sale


In order to raise money for the Fulwood Club, donations of plants and or cakes & bakes by members are requested.

We would like to thank members who have already pledged a donation of plants. At the club, we are fortunate to be able to benefit from the professional experience of Eileen Wood, our former President and co-founder of the Ribblesdale nurseries in 1966.

Last year, Eileen and I (Sylvie) were at times overwhelmed - not by the nature of the questions but the sheer volume of them. This year, 2 members are joining the plant team: Gill Hoyle and Jayne Horrocks. Both contributed a lot of plants last year.

Eileen, Emma (The Money) Gill, Jayne and Sylvie will be on the plant stand, in the far corner of the forecourt.

As was the case last year, Glen will set up the marquee, the tables and equipment needed for the plants.

This is to avoid last year's rush and the inability to re-label plants and carry out other little jobs which are part of the preparation.



On Friday May 10th, Sylvie and another member of the plant team will be at the Club from 2pm onwards. Plants delivered will be relocated to a safe place until the morning of the May 18th. If this is not convenient, please contact Sylvie to arrange a more suitable time.

A few Do's and Don't's

Please bring plants in clean pots.

Label plants if possible. If you have no labels, please ask

Don't bring freshly dug up plants in plastic bags. Get in touch if you need spare pots.

Don't bring plants grown in yoghurt pots or similar, or in dirty muddy pots.

Don't deliver plant donations after 8am on Saturday 18th.

Don't dig up or divide perennials a few days before the sale. Most of them will flop, not recover, and therefore be unsuitable.

Please do not drop off plants and leave them unattended on the forecourt

Please do not deliver plant donations to bar staff even if they appear to be available.

Aromatic herbs and vegetables to grow on are very welcome!

You wish to donate a piece of a plant which you have had for years but you don't remember its name?

No problem. We will help you identify the item(s)



As well as raising money for the maintenance of the Fulwood Club, our objective is to continue to make this a successful annual Spring Event. Therefore our plants need to be varied and the sale of a very good standard. We hope that you will help us achieve this.



Additional information for the sale

Vegetables have deliberately not been mentioned on the posters. This to avoid an influx of people coming to buy vegetables and leaving disappointed. Last year we had a nice selection of donated veg to be grown on and quite a few aromatic herbs.

The emphasis here is on Hardy Plants. A hardy plant is a perennial plant which comes up year after year. Last year there were also quite a lot of colourful annuals.
